# Annual Report 2019-2020

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Your Library Informing - Engaging Entertaining

### **Dear Friends and Patrons**

The Annual Report is designed to inform the Library Board of Trustees and the citizens of Thomaston about the library's collections, programs and services offered in the year 2019-2020. The information contained in this report is based upon statistical data, collected by our library staff members and submitted to the Connecticut State Library for inclusion in its publication, Connecticut's Public Libraries: A Statistical Profile. The Annual Report is presented to the Library Board at its Annual Meeting, held on the first Tuesday in December, and is made available for public perusal following the Annual Meeting.

Our Annual Report provides us with the opportunity to share some of our success and challenges from the past year as well as bringing to light some of the issues that are facing us in the year to come.

2019-20 was the strangest year I have ever experienced in my years as a Librarian. We were scheduling programs and purchasing material to enhance our collection when the world shut down. Literally. As we quickly made plans for the closure we initiated curbside service, began planning for a virtual Summer Reading Program, extended due dates and loaning periods, removed fines and tried to stay in contact with our most consistent users; even telephoning them to see if we could help when we had not heard from them for a period of time. Our library closed to the public on March 17<sup>th</sup> and remained closed to in-person visits until June 17<sup>th</sup>. We

offered curbside service for the entire time we were closed to in-person visits.

When we re-opened we did so in a very strategic manner. We had Plexiglas safety dividers installed on our circulation desks, limited the number of patrons allowed into the building at one time and offered a redesigned computer access area that adheres to the social distancing guidelines of the CDC.

On June 17<sup>th</sup>, according to the Governor's Guidelines, we allowed people back in the building to use computers, browse the collection and even meet in small groups in the library. We have continued to offer curbside service for our patrons who remain concerned about entering the building.

As you review the statistic on the following pages you will notice a significant increase in our on-line circulation as people shifted to those resources.

Most of all, our staff members are thankful that the Library Trustees have supported their need to stay safe from the virus by limiting the public's access to the library. We are all concerned about what will come next with the pandemic and are constantly thinking of ways to stay engaged with the community as we navigate these very unusual times.

## Programs for Children / Babies - Tweens - Teens

Our Children's Department continues to encourage families with children of all ages to explore the wide range of programming we have to offer. We present a variety of programs from birth to teen, our most popular events being baby time, story time, murder mysteries, and mother/ daughter book club. This year's murder mystery, *Pandemo*nium at the Poolside, was broken into three sessions, due to

its huge success the previous year.



Aloha with Books", with 271 participants from preschool age to teens who engaged in over 60 programs. Our program divided participants into groups based on the book Enchanted Tiki Room and each young patron received a gem

for every library item they checked out. This program was an immense success; it bolstered circulation and involvement. With the aid of the Thomaston Rotary Club grant, tote bags were purchased for all the children and teens who registered for the program.

Family was a major focal point

for our summer programming. We brought back one of our most popular family paint nights and added a new program, "Mixed: Family Edition". This new and exciting program was based on the television show "Chopped" where each family received three tropical mystery ingredients that they needed to base a dish around. Needless to say, everyone got creative with their dishes. The two favorite dishes were a pineapple, spam, and rice dish by the Carlo family and

chocolate, coconut, and avocado cupcakes by the Callanan family.

As summer came to a close, we looked for ways to inspire our young patrons to give back to the community. Our new program, Helpng Hands, met every Monday from September to June. Students made goodie bags for the food pantry, cleaned up garbage around Main Street, wrote letters to young children in hospitals, and made dog treats for local animal shelters. Money raised by the group from selling baked goods at the children's craft fair contributed to items that were later donated to the food pantry.



February kicked off our winter reading program "LOVE to Read" which was inspired by a picture book by Eric Carle. Through this program we hosted "take your child to the library day", a "build a sloth" workshop, and we took a bus trip to The Eric Carle Museum of Picture Book Art in Amherst, Massachusetts. The bus trip was an incredible experience for everyone involved; we were able to visit beautiful exhibitions and even view a movie about Eric Carle.

In March when the library was forced to close, our children's department staff rallied to provide our young patrons with alternative programming. Our staff continuously came up with new ways to engage our beloved patrons both virtually and off-line. Our

> librarians brought story time alive online to our youngest patrons and found news ways to interact with older children through games and crafts. One of our best programs included a book club where we held an outside scavenger hunt based off of one of the books. As we continued to navigate library use during the pandemic, we found ways to use our

social media to feature weekly trivia guestions about Harry Potter and Pokémon as well as promote our upcoming programs.



As another year comes to a close, let's reflect upon some of the great activities we have offered our teen patrons. In July we held an enlightening program, "Henna by Elyse", about the history of henna tattooing, what to avoid when getting a henna tattoo, and instruction on how teens can experiment with henna tattoo art.

One of our most popular programs each year is our teen paint night. This year's class was led by local artist Jane Morrison, a graduate of The Savannah College of Art and Design. Our teens had a great time socializing and developing their skills while Jane guided them through the process.
